

**Rhode Island Department of Elementary and Secondary Education
School Choice and other NCLB Sanctions 2005-06**

In August 2005, RIDE staff reviewed the 2004-05 assessment results, attendance rates, and graduation rates of all 43 schools that could face NCLB sanctions during the 2005-06 school year. (Only schools that receive federal Title I funds are subject to these sanctions.)
